Why did you decide to become a lecturer? As a clinician, I thoroughly enjoyed being involved with students on clinical placements, guiding their development, and sharing my knowledge. This experience sparked my interest in education motivating me to take on a more formal academic role. I value the variety that academia offers, allowing me to combine my interests in teaching, research, and clinical practice. The opportunity to engage in clinical and education research, continue with my own professional development and support the development of undergraduate Orthoptists made academia the perfect fit for me.

What is a typical day like in your current role?

One of the aspects I enjoy most about my academic role is the variety it offers — no two days are ever the same. My responsibilities span across teaching, student support, leadership, and widening participation. When teaching, I might deliver a lecture, tutorial, clinical skills session or participate in simulated teaching activities. 

Problem-solving skills are crucial for addressing challenges like recruitment difficulties.
